EYFS & KS1 Phonics Workshop Information Sheet

An Overview of the Phonic Phases

Phase 1- Develop an awareness of rhyme and alliteration. Begin to orally blend and segment phonemes (no letter sounds are taught at this stage).

Phase 2- Work on blending for reading and segmenting for spelling simple CVC words. Learn letter sounds (phonemes) and names (graphemes) in set progression.

Phase 3- Work on learning one grapheme for each of the 43 phonemes including learning some diagraphs and trigraphs. Read and spell CVC words.

Phase 4- Consolidate knowledge of 43 graphemes of Phase 3 and apply to longer words eg. farmer (CVCV).

Phase 5- Learn new graphemes and alternative pronunciations for graphemes already known. Spell words using phonetically plausible attempts.

Phase 6- Develop fluency as reader and become increasingly accurate spellers. Learn range of comprehension strategies and recognize phonic irregularities.

Some definitions:

A **phoneme** is a sound eg. y

A grapheme is the visual representation of that sound eg. you write the letter y A **diagraph** is when you write two letter to make one sound eg. ay or ai A trigraph is when you write three letters to make one sound eg. igh or ear **Blending** is joining a number of phonemes together to make a word **Segmenting** is separating a word into it's separate phonemes CVC (consonant vowel consonant) eg. bed, farm **CVCC** (consonant consonant vowel consonant) eg. float, brick

How can you help at home?

Help children apply what they learn in phonics by applying it to things in their everyday routine at home eg.

•Play phoneme spotter eg. magazine, recipe book, back of cereal packet

 Read regularly at home, talk about the book and look for tricky words and phonemes •Encourage children to have a go when they attempt writing by sounding out using their phonics and tricky word knowledge. Don't worry about them getting everything right!
